Spring is here and so is road work season. Some of you have already seen our public works crew begin long-awaited improvements to Hereford Road at the end of March. The road widening stage of the project went well and further repairs to the existing road will be ongoing throughout the summer. We will also continue repairs on the lower section of Trail Road North and start widening the upper section – a challenging area with tough ironstone alongside this narrow stretch. Last, but not least, a summer paving overlay marks the completion of our three-year Harvest Road reconstruction project.

Planning for future road projects is a critical part of balancing Township resources with the key responsibility of maintaining public infrastructure. We will soon begin our bi-annual update of the five-year Road Improvement Plan that evaluates outstanding road work and pavement management needs for the years ahead. This process involves assessing conditions in the field, estimating costs for repairs and/or maintenance, and aligning priorities with budget constraints.

We've made significant headway in recent years but the progress cannot stop – because the wear and tear on our local roadways doesn't either. We are asking those participating in this event for donations of canned goods and boxed items (monetary donations are also accepted). Please be generous, as these donations will be given to the local food banks. Their greatest needs include canned meats, juice, canned/boxed pasta, jams/jellies, cereals, pancake mixes and syrup, and paper products. Baby food and formula will also be accepted. No perishable items, please. Donations should be non-expired, non-breakable, and all items should be in unopened containers. Glass, frozen food, fresh produce/meats or home-made food will not be accepted. Your help is truly appreciated by those in need in our community!

# **Northwest EMS**



CPR is a life-saving skill you can learn through Northwest EMS. We are now offering classes in the communities we serve: Elizabethtown, Manheim, Maytown, Brickerville and surrounding areas. To find a class that meets your needs, whether it is CPR/AED certification for employment, or Hands-Only CPR for citizens, call Lori Shenk, Community Outreach Manager, at 717-371-8282. We also provide first-aid classes, bike-safety awareness, and other programs.

If you are considering a career or volunteer service with an ambulance, Northwest EMS offers two options.

High school students in Elizabethtown and Donegal school districts can contact their guidance counselor about enrolling in an EMT course leading to certification through the National Registry of EMTs. During 2021, 38 students were certified, including 26 as EMTs and 12 as Advanced EMTs.

Other area residents can sign up for EMT classes co-hosted by Northwest EMS and the ETOWN EDGE community education program at Elizabethtown College. Look for the course at edge.etown.edu.

If you have not yet sent your annual ambulance subscription for Northwest EMS, you can still pay online at nwems86.org/ services/. Click on "Pay Online." A voluntary subscription benefits you by covering the deductible or co-pay part of your ambulance bill from an emergency response. # **BURNING ORDINANCE**

At this time of year, we begin to get questions about the Township burning ordinance and specifically burning pits. Burning pits are allowed in Mt Joy Township if they are done within safety guidelines.

- A burning pit cannot be greater than 3 feet across
- It should have a wire mesh screen, with openings or two inches or less over the flame to prevent embers from rising into the air.
- No household trash, recyclables, leaves or yard waste shall be burned.
- The pit shall be located at least 15 feet away from a building, structure or other flammable material
- A responsible adult must be present at all times when burning
- A pit fire must be extinguished immediately after use and not left to "burn out."
- A pit fire, or any fire, shall not be used in dry drought conditions or high winds.



# SAFETY TIPS

- Propane and charcoal BBQ grills should only be used outdoors.
- The grill should be placed well away from the home, deck railings and out from under eaves and overhanging branches.
- Keep children and pets at least three feet away from the grill area.
- Keep your grill clean by removing grease or fat buildup from the grills and in trays below the grill.
- Never leave your grill unattended.
- Always make sure your gas grill lid is open before lighting it.

# **CHARCOAL GRILLS**

- There are several ways to get the charcoal ready to use. Charcoal chimney starters allow you to start the charcoal using newspaper as a fuel.
- If you use a starter fluid, use only charcoal starter fluid. Never add charcoal fluid or any other flammable liquids to the fire.
- Keep charcoal fluid out of the reach of children and away from heat sources.
- There are also electric charcoal starters, which do not use fire. Be sure to use an extension cord for outdoor use.
- When you are finished grilling, let the coals completely cool before disposing in a metal container.

# PROPANE Grills

Check the gas tank hose for leaks before using it for the first time each year. Apply a light scap and water solution to the hose. A propane leak will release bubbles. If your grill has a gas leak, by smell or the scapy bubble test, and there is no flame, turn off both the gas tank and the grill. If the leak stops, get the grill serviced by a professional before using it again. If the leak does not stop, call the fire department. If you smell gas while cooking, immediately get away from the grill and call the fire department. Do not move the grill

If the flame **goes out**, turn the grill and gas off and wait at least **5 minutes** before re-lighting it.



- July is the peak month for grill fires.
- Roughly half of the injuries involving grills are thermal burns.

# Four Signs That It's a Scam

- 1. **Scammers PRETEND to be from an organization you know.** Scammers often pretend to be contacting you on behalf of the government. They might use a real name, like the Social Security Administration, the IRS, or Medicare, or make up a name that sounds official. Some pretend to be from a business you know, like a utility company, a tech company, or even a charity asking for donations. They use technology to change the phone number that appears on your caller ID, so the name and number you see might not be real.
- 2. **Scammers say there's a PROBLEM or a PRIZE.** They might say you're in trouble with the government, you owe money, someone in your family had an emergency, or there is a virus on your computer. Some scammers say there's a problem with one of your accounts and that you need to verify some information. Others will lie and say you won money in a lottery or sweepstakes but have to pay a fee to get it.
- 3. **Scammers PRESSURE you to act immediately.** Scammers want you to act before you have time to think. If you're on the phone, they might tell you not to hang up so you can't check out their story. They might threaten to arrest you, sue you, take away your driver's or business license, or deport you. They might say your computer is about to be corrupted.
- **4. Scammers tell you to PAY in a specific way.** They often insist that you pay by sending money through a money transfer company or by putting money on a gift card and then giving them the number on the back. Some will send you a check (that will later turn out to be fake), then tell you to deposit it and send them money.

# What You Can Do to Avoid a Scam

**Block unwanted calls and text messages.** Take steps to block unwanted calls and to filter unwanted text messages.

Don't give your personal or financial information in response to a request that you didn't expect. Legitimate organizations won't call, email, or text to ask for your personal information, like your Social Security, bank account, or credit card numbers. If you get an email or text message from a company you do business with and you think it's real, it's still best not to click on any links. Instead, contact them using a website you know is trustworthy or look up their phone number. Don't call a number they gave you or the number from your caller ID.

**Resist the pressure to act immediately.** Legitimate businesses will give you time to make a decision. Anyone who pressures you to pay or give them your personal information is a scammer.

**Know how scammers tell you to pay.** Never pay someone who insists you pay with a gift card or by using a money transfer service. Never deposit a check and send money back to someone.

**Stop and talk to someone you trust.** Before you do anything else, tell someone - a friend, a family member, a neighbor - what happened. Talking about it could help you realize it's a scam.

REPORT SCAMS TO THE FTC. If you were scammed or think you saw a scam, report it to the Federal Trade Commission.
